DEADWOOD NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH – APRIL, 2013

Formal incident reports have not been filed the month of March with DNW. But DNW received calls regarding a new lawn mower having been stolen from a private property on Highway 36, East in Deadwood. The owner filed a police report of the theft.

Other calls have come in concerning unidentified persons in the vicinity of vacant homes. DNW is in the process of contacting owners of the vacant properties and discussing security options.

There is a resurgence of loud vehicles speeding on our streets (West Fork Rd, Deadwood Creek Rd.). A white Suzuki truck and a red Volkswagen in particular have been observed. Owners have been contacted. Peace and safety dictate that we reduce vehicle noise, and stay within the speed limits.

Gunshots have been reported coming from the West Fork Rd area and these are of concern because a variety of bikers, hikers and dog walkers use this scenic road daily. We wish to remind us all that law prohibits shooting across creeks, rivers, and across roads. The quarry is a place to go for target practice.

There will be a meeting of Deadwood Neighborhood Watch members the second week of every month, April 11, 2013, at 6:30 – 7:30 p.m. at the Community Center.

Tales From The Tunnel

Being a Professional Print Media Distribution Specialist I am afforded the luxury work hours of 1:30 AM until, well whatever it takes to get the job done. Sometimes because of things beyond my control, this can be well past daylight. That means I'm out in the tree lined tunnel of weather when virtually none of you are. So I thought I would tell you about things you don't see.

That being said, I was out about 2 years ago 3 miles up Deadwood Creek Road and, through the rain and fog, I noticed 2 vehicles parked on the side of the road. Forest Service. Hmmm, what were they up to? Well, I peddled my wares up and down West Fork and to the covered bridge and turned around and headed down to Hwy 36. Just coming to those vehicles, 2 people appeared out of the woods, headlights on, sporting a variety of equipment. I stopped, got out of my car, identified myself, and when the blood drained back into their faces they told me they were wildlife biologists from OSU doing a yearlong survey of owl populations in Western Oregon.

I frequently see owls. They swoop by my windshield; fly alongside while I'm driving. I see them in trees, on fencepost, and standing along the side of the road. I see all different sizes. I see them eating things. Sometimes this is not for the faint of heart.

This was a husband, wife team assigned for a week to predetermined areas of the Siuslaw Watershed. They used GPS to find their way in and out. That night they had observed four of seven owl species found in Western Oregon. He took out his state of the art camera and showed me pictures of the Great Horned, Spotted, Screech and, what I thought were babies, the Pygmy Owl full grown at about 13 inches. He then pulled out a recorder and played me what they sound like. I had seen and heard all of this in the tunnel and now was enlightened.

For those of you of a narrow persuasion, hey you know who you are, this is not a waste of money. Owl research keeps us on the cutting edge of Optical Science. Science, you gotta love it. For you subscribers to the newspaper, bravo, I've been able to double up on my Porsche payments. For non-subscribers, please do. I'd like to secure tickets for that world cruise.

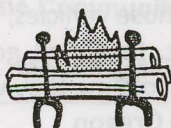

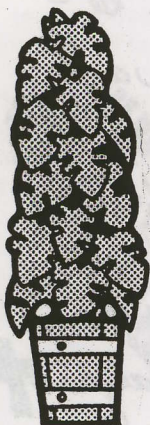

When I was a boy of ten or twelve it was a great day in Atlanta when the circus train came to town. As part of the advertisement the train, with its caged lions, its elephants on flat cars, its tattooed lady posing in an open box car door was a neighborhood attraction.

The circus band would serenade the tattooed lady.

"Oh, Lydia, oh Lydia, oh have you seen Lydia, Oh Lydia the tattooed lady!" Only a few children had parents who could afford tickets during the Great Depression. Most of us would gather by the railroad tracks and get within smelling distance of the slowly moving circus train.

So many of us crawled under the fringes of the canvas and lay on our stomachs. Since I was well on my way to puberty I was particularly attracted to the women barebacked riders who rode galloping horses standing up. (The women. Not the horses.)

Once in a while, some generous soul above would notice us and drop us a bag of goobers, our name for peanuts. That was before George Washington Carver, a black man, concocted peanut butter.
