A METAPHOR OF SORTS: and a personal request: Please do not be divisive.

From the earliest recorded times of human history, various sects of belief systems have been formed by the searching mind and spirit in order to explain this existence on earth. All of these faiths believed in some supreme being(s) made up of gods and goddesses either in human or animal form. These sects evolved and grew into complex religions, until the most popular and persistent, claiming only one God (or three) as their own, threw out or tried to destroy people who were seen as "heretical", either because their version was different from that existing religion, or because they wanted none of the versions. This unique 'ownership' of the deity (i.e. My God), by varying religious sects perceived in their particularized forms, although creating solace for believers, has also created fierce wars and infinite injustices from time immemorial to this day, as everyone knows. Every sect and religion fiercely believes theirs is the Only Truth, climbing their chosen mountain of beliefs with great conviction and throwing those who deviate even slightly, off the cliff. A rough estimate is that there are over 4,200 religions in the world. The dominant ones are Judeo-Christian-Muslim...all having varying sects within the main thrust of their belief systems. Far-Eastern religions as well as Western and Middle Eastern ones can be exclusional.

One of my metaphors for this phenomenon is the following: These many religions together make up a vast 'stew' which often boils over at ground level. Individuals or groups absorbing their favored ingredient, cherishing the flavor, tell others that theirs is the <u>only</u> nourishing one (i.e the True religion). The *broth* of this stew is made up of human contradictions and spiritual arrogance, and it seeps into all the separate ingredients. These ingredients do not normally blend with each other, but often actually fight each other. Witness all the "holy" wars. (Not to mention what is happening now, even this moment all over the world!)

A smaller percentage of humans find that their spirit/mind/body unity cannot digest any of this stew's ingredients. And many of those individuals separately or together make their way up some undiscovered and differently challenging mountains in order to drink from clear, running water originating in the highest, hidden streams. They have no agenda of convincing anyone that their journey is of value to others. Sadly, these people have been vilified throughout history. It makes the conventionally religious uncomfortable to have them in their midst, and they are forever trying to evangelize ("save") the non-conformists from themselves. (Spare us your 'kindness' which in some cases takes the form of bullying, begging, confronting and harrassing even some of your own members who might have some slight difference of opinion while being true to their faith). In some countries any independence of spirit is punished by death, to this day. It is hard to comprehend that there are large demographics in democratic countries which think there is something dangerous in preferring only clear water, untouched by other elements. So I, too, "beg", but in a different vein; please do not be divisive. And here comes another metaphor: Be a good neighbor and don't violate other's land, trying to pull up their special flowers and plants. Do not continuously try to plant your own vegetation in other's gardens. Let all of us live together in peace and enjoy the differences.

Title: <u>"A Call for Democracy"</u> (That can't be controversial or divisive, can it?)

I respect everyone's right to believe <u>whatever</u> they choose. I will fight for that right. .. and I have done so, all my life! My suggestion is, that if a simple majority of the whole community accepts the Ditto's new guidelines, and agrees that our Ditto is the appropriate vehicle for such content, as proposed in those guidelines, then it should be made so. However I would subsequently be frightened of my unknown neighbors with such a majority, and I can guarantee there would be no more submissions from me. (Which I imagine some people would prefer in any case).

However, I'd really like to know what was the substance of "feedback" the editor mentioned in the last Ditto, feedback which was received from the <u>DCS</u> about the startling set of "guidelines" created for Ditto content. I heard of no announcement that was open to the whole <u>community</u> with the purpose of laying ground rules. Perhaps I missed it (?) In my many decades of life I have never found that an open forum on either far more so in a tiny community. Is it really up to the editor of a community newsletter to decide what is and isn't "divisive"? Should it be? Is this submission of mine going to be refused? Can we all please have a say, now that it seems to be determined that "guidelines" are in order, after the Ditto's long history of having none? Just determining that submissions on these two topics "should have a local focus" does not make the decision welcome. It seems more like an excuse to do whatever an editor pleases, when the rationale is to focus on the "local" while including compromising content. Where are the democratic principles? When an editor turns to only one friend for feedback about creating these rules (far from 'guidelines') - a friend who is likely of similar persuasion - we can be certain it does not create a democratic opportunity for submissions! It feels more like a 'takeover' or a 'coup'. I recommend there be a print out of the names of people in attendance at that DCS meeting, people who agreed to what I see as a very very odd and subversive set of requirements and policies.

There is already a plethora of "political" content and "religious awakenings" on the web. It's <u>everywhere</u> - we can't escape it - it's on the news of TV channels, on the radio, in hundreds of publications, and wherever one turns. It's a veritable inundation. Do we then also have to have it forced on us in our little Ditto as well? Can we please have just a simple, relaxing, friendly, neighborly print out with relevance to our community activities and members, but without other people's political or religious cries in the dark? Or searches for the light? These "guidelines' are way out of place from my perspective.

In addition, these guidelines and explanation about them feel very authoritarian to me, whether or not they were intended that way. I was quite shocked. So I highly recommend we have a meeting open to all of us for purposes of a yes or no vote on these rules, and for those who cannot attend, we can create a questionnaire that is not slanted journalism, but neutral, giving every person who lives here the chance to decide whether or not they want our Ditto to print even more "religious awakenings" and more "political content" than is already zapping us from multi-media all around. And I would like to be on the board of creating this questionnaire, please. I am not overly paranoid, but this proposal could certainly make me so. Egad!
