It's not too late to place your order for the annual plant giveaway!

River, and lakeside landowners are eligible to receive up to 300 free native plants from us this year, free of charge! Native plants growing along streams help reduce erosion, filter nutrients, and keep the water cool for salmon, trout and other aquatic species. Native plants are adapted to specific site conditions; we have some resources available to help you identify which plants will thrive alongside your backyard creek or lake! Siuslaw Watershed Council staff can also help advise you on plant selection and placement.



The Wave continues with lunch and a celebration at 1:30 p.m., along with a fundraiser for the new "Heart of the Coast" Housing Alliance, at the Florence Senior Center, 1570 Kingwood Street.

"Our celebration/fundraiser will support and promote our new "Heart of the Coast" Housing Alliance to help us bring affordable housing to Florence."
