<u>Local Wildflower Honey Fundraiser at the</u> Fill Your Pantry Event

Sunday November 8, 2020 at Siuslaw Middle School

Everyone knows the health benefits from consuming local raw honey, particularly the boosting of the immune system and providing tons of disease fighting antioxidants and vitamins. But finding that local honey, especially here along the Oregon Coast, can be challenging. Well, the Central Coast Beekeepers Association (CCBA) has some great news for all of you honey lovers in search of that golden nectar!

Over the past couple of months, several members of the CCBA along the coast, have collected their local raw honey and bottled two different special wildflower blends. These will be exclusively sold at the Florence Farmers Market Fill Your Pantry Event on Sunday November 8th, 2020. This honey is being sold as a fundraiser for the Oregon State University (OSU) Bee Lab with all proceeds going toward a donation to the ongoing research and extension programs at the lab.

For \$10, you can purchase a one-pound jar of either the Light Oregon Coast Wildflower Honey or the limited edition of the Dark Oregon Coast Wildflower Honey. Both types are loaded with local anti-viral, anti-bacterial properties which are great for boosting the immunity and helping combat allergies. Quantities are limited, so make sure you order early. Now is the time to stock up for the winter season.

The Fill Your Pantry Event will be held on Sunday November 8th from Noon until 3 pm at the parking lot and covered area of the Siuslaw Middle School – 2525 Oak Street in Florence. It will be a drive through market with no money exchanged. You must pre-order your honey via the Whats Good App online starting on October 26th and ending on November 2nd only. The drive-through pick up event will be following the state and county Covid-19 guidelines for your health and safety. All volunteers and participating vendors will take the necessary precautions and thank you for being respectful of the state and county requirements to ensure the safety of everyone involved.

Volunteer Opportunity

Friends of Florence is seeking new drivers. This free bus service, for cancer patients who are receiving radiation treatment, operates Monday through Friday, all year long. A driver's shift requires approximately five hours, from 7:30 a.m. to noon. Volunteers typically drive once per month. The Friends' bus is a 14-passenger vehicle. A commercial driver's license is not required. "It's about the same size as a small RV," said Bart Mealer, Chief Operating Officer for the organization.

As a result of the current COVID-19 pandemic, the organization has taken several steps to help ensure the safety and health of drivers and passengers. Some of these steps are:

- All passengers including the driver will wear face coverings while on the bus.
- Everyone will have their temperatures taken prior to boarding the bus.
- We have limited the number of passengers on the bus to four. This allows for 6ft of physical distancing.
- The bus will be cleaned and sanitized daily at the end of each trip.

"Cancer patients have to travel to Eugene or Springfield daily for these radiation treatments—it's 160 miles roundtrip from Florence," added Mealer." Riding the bus helps ease the stress during this difficult time."

For over 34 years the Friends of Florence, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, has transported patients roundtrip from Florence to the Willamette Valley Cancer Institute and to the Oregon Urology Institute. The bus leaves from Peace Harbor Hospital and, when requested, has pick-up locations in Mapleton and Veneta. The Friends maintain about 22 active drivers.

"Riding the bus also offers companionship for patients who are making this trip every day. It shows them that they're not alone," said Mealer. "It's a traveling support group." If you are interested in driving for the Friends of Florence, please contact Bart Mealer at 541-997-8663.


To Our Watershed Community:
