## **It's time to order!**

The 23<sup>rd</sup> Annual [Native Plant Distribution](#) (NPD) is just around the corner. The Siuslaw Watershed Council (SWC) will once again provide free native plants for waterside riparian planting in the Siuslaw Basin and Coastal Lakes areas. Trees planted along streams provide bank stability, filter nutrients,

and provide shade, which helps keep our waters cool for salmon and trout. Increasing the abundance of native species will also help the local flora outcompete unwanted invasive plant species.

Planting native species within our local riparian zones is important to us and we understand it can be a lot of work. If you're needing help, don't hesitate to ask for assistance with site prepping, planting, or even upkeep. Assistance is available from SWC for free on a limited basis. Call our office (541-268-3044) or email [nativeplants@siuslaw.org](mailto:nativeplants@siuslaw.org) to request help from SWC habitat restoration technicians. Funding is provided by the Coast Range Stewardship Fund.

After registering, you will receive a confirmation email containing information about joining the meeting.

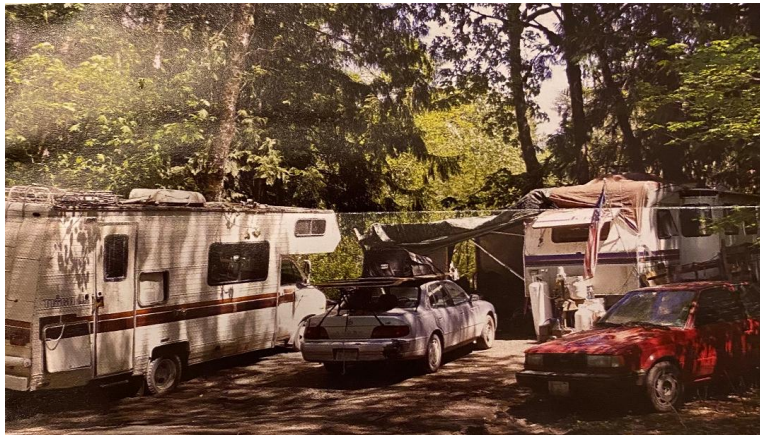




### Introductory Note:

### MAKING A HOME IN THE FOREST: NON RECREATIONAL CAMPING ON NATIONAL FORESTS AND GRASSLANDS - Part 1

*To Give aid to every poor man is far beyond the reach and power of every man...Care of the poor is incumbent on society as a whole.*

Benedict Spinoza, Dutch philosopher

Caring for the land and Serving the People - this has been the mission of the U.S. Forest Service since the agency's creation in 1905. Who these *people* are has evolved over the years to encompass an even greater spectrum of society. People are communities that depend upon the national forests for economic revenue. People are recreationists seeking the national forests to connect with nature or fish. People are those who use the national forest to engage in cultural practices of hunting and gathering. People are Americans and citizens from other countries.

Yet, in spite of this ever-expanding concept of *people*, there still remain people who are overlooked and underserved.



**Types of Nonrecreational Campers and Definitions,  
Based on Conversations with Forest Service Law Enforcement Officers<sup>a</sup>**

Nonrecreational camper types	Definition
Transient retirees	Individuals who appear to be elderly or retired and live in campers or recreational vehicles
Solitary or antisocial individuals	Individuals who are living alone; some may be survivalists or separatists or antisocial
Homeless adult groups	Informal gatherings of homeless adults, where group members may come and go
Families	Family groups of multiple generations, parents with children, or single parent families
Forest workers	Workers in logging, commercial harvest of mushrooms, berries, or floral greens
Seasonal recreational or amenity workers	Recreational guides, ski instructors, or outfitters working in outdoor recreation or tourism
Fugitives	Individuals with outstanding warrants or who are wanted by law enforcement
Students	Undergraduate or graduate students at universities who live in the national forest while they attend school
Teens, gangs, or runaways	Groups of teenagers or young adults who may be runaways; some may be formal or informal "gangs"
Communal groups	Organized and informal groups that intentionally choose to live in the forest and which may be nomadic

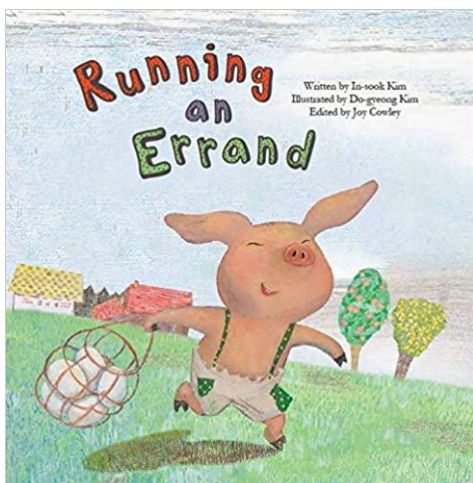
The meeting agenda will include:
