Global Warming Factoids

- If one million people reduced their trash by 10 percent, we'd keep 600,000 tons of CO₂ out of the atmosphere per year. (Twenty-five billion Styrofoam cups are thrown away by Americans each year.)
- A cell phone is about 14 percent copper by weight and also contains gold, silver, and about one cent's worth of platinum. These are precious metals; so don't throw away your old cell. Phone and office-supply shops usually have phone-recycling bins.
- One pound of meat requires eight times as much energy to produce as one pound of veggie protein, such as tofu. (One million cows burp about 220 tons of methane per day.)
- In 2005, the summer Arctic ice sheet shrank to two million square miles—and it may disappear by 2040. (If all of Greenland's ice sheet and glaciers melt, sea levels could rise 23 feet.)
- Twenty-three billion gallons of gas are idled away each year by Americans while stuck in traffic. (Half an hour of bicycling daily can increase your life expectancy by up to four years.)
- If one million people switched to reusable bags, we'd eliminate the need for one billion plastic bags. (Fourteen million trees were cut down in 1999 to supply the U.S. with paper bags.)
- If one million Americans used rain barrels, they could collect enough water for the daily usage of about one million others. (Six hundred gallons can be collected from a 1,000-square-foot roof covered with an inch of rainfall.)

The key to preventing moldy berries...

Berries are delicious, but they're also kind of delicate. Raspberries in particular seem like they can mold before you even get them home from the market. There's nothing more tragic than paying \$4 for a pint of local raspberries, only to look in the fridge the next day and find that fuzzy mold growing on their insides. Well, with fresh berries just starting to hit farmers markets, we can tell you that how to keep them fresh! Here's a tip worth sharing on how to prevent them from getting there in the first place.

Wash them with vinegar. When you get your berries home, prepare a mixture of one part vinegar (white or apple cider probably work best) and ten parts water. Dump the berries into the mixture and swirl around. Drain, rinse if you want (though the mixture is so diluted you can't taste the vinegar,) and pop in the fridge. The vinegar kills any mold spores and other bacteria that might be on the surface of the fruit, and voila! Raspberries will last a week or more, and strawberries go almost two weeks without getting moldy and soft. So go forth and stock up on those pricey little gems, knowing they'll stay fresh as long as it takes you to eat them. You're so berry welcome!

UDIG will again be offering weekly boxes of fruit and vegetables this summer for 10 weeks, July 22 through September 16. Boxes will contain 5 or 6 items each, and depending on the season, will include berries, lettuces, other greens, and late summer crops such as tomatoes, green beans, or corn.

A subscription for all 10 boxes will be \$150, as it has been the past two seasons. Eggs from Sayda will again be an option; one dozen each week for \$35.

Boxes typically contain a newsletter with news about our gardens and recipe ideas.
